MANUEL DE BEAUPUIS, born in 1860, at Naples, in which city his father was long a prominent figure in musical circles. At the age of twelve he was sent to the Conservatorium, where he remained until he was eighteen, his principal teacher being Beniamino Cesi, himself a pupil, and a favorite one, of Thalberg. On leaving the Conservatorium he made a series of successful professional tours through the principal towns of Italy, Egypt, France, and England. As a pianist Signor de Beaupuis is recognised as one of the most brilliant of the present day. As an exponent of Chopin he ranks high amongst our greatest pianists, whilst in the interpretations of the famous Composer Liszt, it is doubtful if he has ever had his equal.
