YOU'RE SO GOOD, DADDY.—This song fills a long-felt want. There are many "mother songs" but none had ever been written for "father or daddy," until Miss Starr wrote this. It appeals to all hearts alike, and is full of a tender pathos. It is one of the most popular songs from the pen of this author.
DEM TANTALIZIN' LITTLE TWIN COONS.—An innovation in the way of "coon melodies," because it treats of two, instead of one "mischevious little nigger," who make all sorts of trouble for their "mammy" till she reckons "dey'll win up in jail." The only song of its kind on the market, and full of mirth which is contageous
THE FIREMAN'S DREAM.—In which Miss Starr depicts all the heroism and bravery of a fireman. Through the chorus, one can almost hear the engine, and the cries of "fire," see the flames, and the noble "fire laddie" rescuing the helpless. A truly "descriptive" song
SWEET KATIE MAGEE.—This is the story of "faint heart never won fair lady" sung with great success by Miss Jennie Yeamans. The refrain is catchy with the "waltzy" swing which is so preferable.
ANNIE KELLY.—An Irish melody, wherein a fond lover depicts his tender feelings on his wedding morning, a novel subject for a song, and extremely pretty4
CLIMB DE GOLDEN FENCE.—A song written in conjunction with Mr. Nat. D. Mann, which treats of "chicken stealing," "mellon plugging," and a few other tricks attributed to the genus "coon."
THE WHISTLING GIRL.—Suggested by the old saying: "Whistling girls and crowing hens, Always come to dreadful ends."
This little song disproves the old adage, and has a very "catchy" refrain40
TWO LITTLE JAPANESE DOLLS.—A quaint little doll story, of their courtship, marriage and cruel separation.
AFTER THE WEDDING.—A story from life. It tells of the marriage of two who had been married and divorced before they had met each other, after the wedding each meet their old love, and shortly after, learn that the divorced ones have also married each other40
GO TO SLEEP MY HONEY.—A plantation lullaby, showing how a "black Mammy" tries to put her piccaninny to sleep, by telling it stories which only serve to keep it awake, and after a sound spanking from "Mammy," whose patience has been exhausted, do the drowsy eyelids close
SHE IS THE SWEETEST GIRL I KNOW (Bessie).—A song about a "sweet girl," Bessie, of whom a friend of the composer once said, "she can make or break me." With a delightful refrain, in which everybody wants to join
WAY DOWN COON HOLLOW.—This song was suggested to the composer by the play "Coon Hollow," for which play the song was written, and is successfully sung by Miss Hamilton
MOTHER WATCHES O'ER HER BOY.—The story of a young man whose loving and devoted mother waited nightly at the gate for her boy's return from work. He came home one night to find her sleeping her last sleep in the armchair. One of these tender "mother songs" so full of human interest to us all.
TWO LITTLE BABIES.—A lullaby about two little babies who were betrothed in their cradles. Mothers love to sing this pretty "sleep song" to their little ones40
NOBODY LOVES ME.—This song is even prettier than its fellow "Somebody Loves Me," and speaks a volume to the heart that hungers for affection
GOOD-BYE, GOOD-BYE.—In this song Miss Starr tells us how this great parting word is differently expressed. Well written to appropriate music. Dedicated to and sung by Miss Jessie Bartlett Davis. Title bears a handsome photo of this celebrated artist40
LAUGH YO' LITTLE NIGGERS.—An entirely new creation in "coon song." Miss Starr who has heretofore been writing Piccaninny Melodies, in which cry effects were introduced, deviated in this instance, and introduces the "Laughing Coon." She has also added an ingenious Instrumental Cake Patrol instead of the perrenial dance. The title page is novel, and the song bids fair to become popular
