
Four Neringan Impressions for Hans Aaen

Four Neringan Impressions:

No 1: Waves in the Morning Rain: Moderato

No 2: Calm Sea at Noon: Adagio

No 3: Afternoon Storms and Games: Allegro

No 4: Moonlight over Neringa: Andante.

Writing any impressionistic piano pieces about the Sea is bound to raise comparisons with Debussy, so the obvious solution is to put a direct quotation in and leave it at that. These pieces were commissioned by Hans Aaen after a gathering of Baltic Friends in Nida, Lithuania in the autumn of 2004.

The Kurshes Spit is a 97 kilometres long peninsula separating the Kurshes Lagoon from the Baltic Sea. Just over half lies in Lithuania, the rest in Russia. It is a paradise for birds and fishermen. Not surprisingly it was turned into a UNESCO World Heritage Site. At its widest it is 3.8 kilometres wide, at its narrowest 380 metres. The dunes are alive and move with the wind. Nature still contends with the hand of man and it is a fragile place. The Lagoon is calm; the Baltic often not. Like all seascapes the play of light on cloud, and sea makes for a rapidly changing vista. Like all seascapes, the breath and depth of the vision leaves one in awe of the majesty of nature.

The view from the window where we gathered caught our imaginations; the ever changing patterns of the sea and the sky and light reflected between the two.

These impressions are but an inadequate attempt to capture the very changing moods of this landscape. They were written to be performed by Nellie Adbi with her skilful playing in mind. She first performed them in *Agora*, an ecumenical centre in St Petersburg, on 26th December 2005.
